

Frequently Asked Questions (FAQs): Thermal Scan

3. **What happens during a thermal examination?**
 - proper paperwork is needed to be filled out and completed with signatures.
 - All jewelry, head gear, clothing (undergarments only or 2-piece bathing suit), need to be removed and stored in a safe and secure location.
 - Internal examination, review results. 30 minutes
 - Physical Examination: Standing 1-2 hours
 - Thermal Examination: Standing 1 hour
4. **What do I need to bring?** You must bring a **8 gb USB drive** with you so you can take home copies of all images, and the body analysis report. **Undergarments only** must be loose bathing suit material. Women/men need to have their hair up and out of their face.
5. **Why do you need my medical history?** Medical history is important, there are major issues and surgeries that can be picked up on the thermal scan. Pins, rods, braces, bars, can be picked up with the heat signatures. To get accurate results within the reports, scars, marks, moles, tumors, are all taken into consideration. I also need to know in case of an emergency and can react properly if a serious issue arises. For example, if a person is diabetic, and is running low on sugar.
